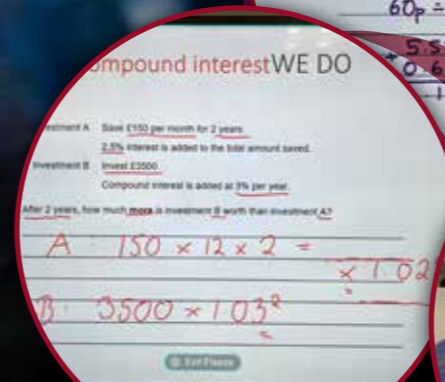
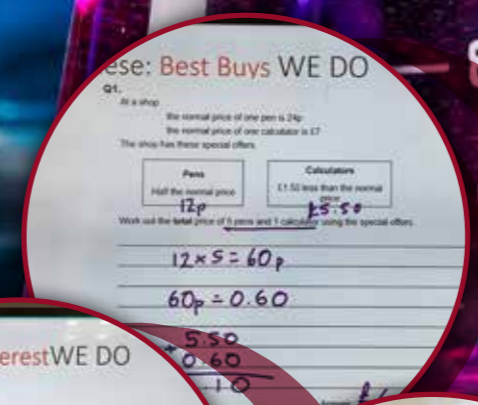
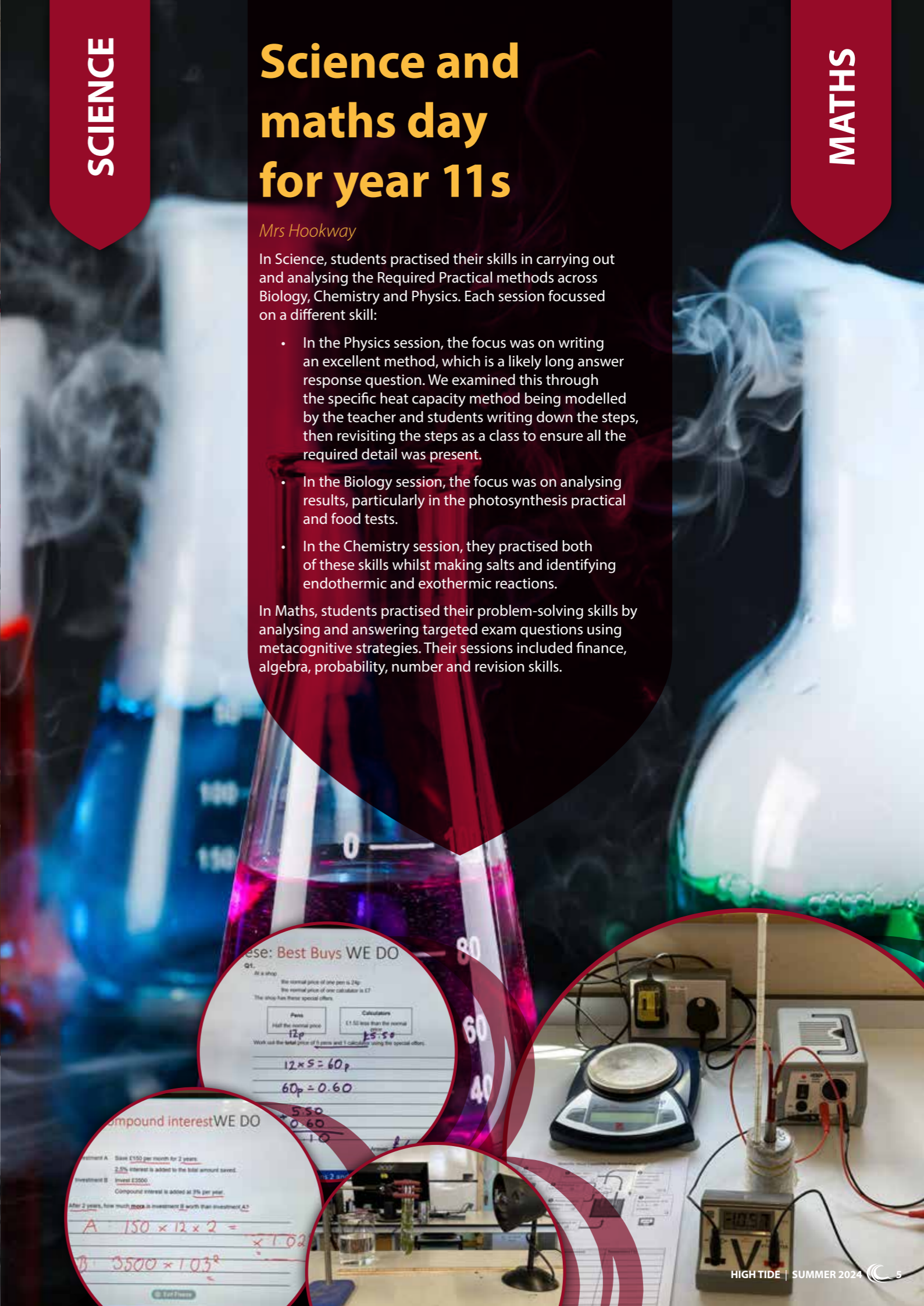
Science and maths day for year 11s

In Science, students practised their skills in carrying out and analysing the Required Practical methods across Biology, Chemistry and Physics. Each session focussed on a different skill:

- In the Physics session, the focus was on writing an excellent method, which is a likely long answer response question. We examined this through the specific heat capacity method being modelled by the teacher and students writing down the steps, then revisiting the steps as a class to ensure all the required detail was present.
- In the Biology session, the focus was on analysing results, particularly in the photosynthesis practical and food tests.
- In the Chemistry session, they practised both of these skills whilst making salts and identifying endothermic and exothermic reactions.

In Maths, students practised their problem-solving skills by analysing and answering targeted exam questions using metacognitive strategies. Their sessions included finance, algebra, probability, number and revision skills.

Virtual author visit from Tom Palmer

Author of award-winning books on a range of sports and historical topics, Tom spent nearly an hour talking to and taking questions from a rapt audience of Year 7 students.

Reading Challenge students had been reading Tom's books, having been gifted a copy each by the school. They had prepared questions for Tom, which were, in his words, "the best questions I've been asked in a long time". They included wanting to know what is favourite childhood book was and how it inspired him, whether it was harder for him to write a female character than a male one, why he focuses on ordinary people rather than heroes when writing books about war and many others.

The feedback from students after the visit was overwhelmingly enthusiastic and Tom's books have been flying off the Library shelves. Jonah read 'D Day Dog' in one evening and said "it was an amazing book. It included some emotional parts, it was very well-written and included a very good message." The English Department made sure there were copies of the books in their fantastic vending machine for the English Weekly Winners, and these have been snapped up.

Tom said of the event: "It was fab. I loved it. I wish I had come in person." We wholeheartedly agree and hope to arrange a visit in person in the near future.

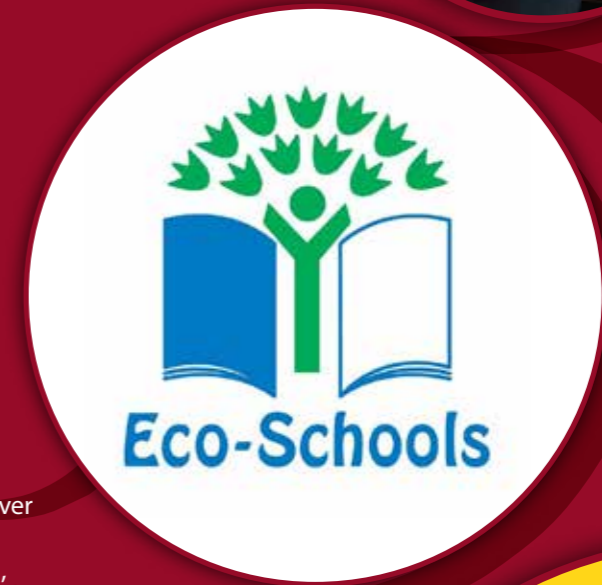
Eco-schools programme

Duke of Edinburgh Award updates

Duke of Edinburgh Award – visit from Duncan Baker, MP.

It has been just over a year since we first introduced the Duke of Edinburgh programme at Sheringham High School and Sixth form. We were lucky enough to be the recipient of an award that has enabled us to purchase the equipment students need for expeditions and ensure we have a team of staff, fully trained to deliver the qualification.

We currently have 33 students on the Bronze programme and 25 completing the Silver level. In March, Mr Baker had the opportunity to meet the new bronze recruits who were ably lead by our Silver D of E students in the art of navigating using a compass and an OS map, cooking using the camp stoves and how to put up tents successfully. They were also able to share some top tips for the expedition.

Mr Baker completed his Bronze, Silver and Gold awards at school and, indeed, is the only current serving MP to have done so, something he is rightly proud of. He commented "I'm a huge advocate of DofE. I loved every minute of doing it and have very fond memories that have stayed with me. I think the school is doing a fantastic job of giving these young people a really unique experience and I wish all schools could make this available. It's clear to see the impact of this funding, and the kit that it has enabled the school to have available. I hope it encourages others to look into it".

To achieve their Award, students in Year 9/10 and in the Sixth Form, Year 12, choose activities in four sections: improving a Physical and Skills activity, Volunteering for a cause of their choice, and completing a demanding Expedition. Along the way, they have fun, grow in resilience and self-belief, discover new talents and passions, and learn practical skills to help them in future – while working towards a highly respected Award. This year's Bronze cohort has already contributed to the community in many ways, including volunteering at charity shops, local churches and youth groups. We have also seen students develop new skills in looking after livestock and taking up new hobbies such as cooking or marksmanship! The physical section has enabled students to consider getting outside more or joining a sports club. There is so much going on within our school community and we are really proud of these students who have taken to this award and are flying with it.

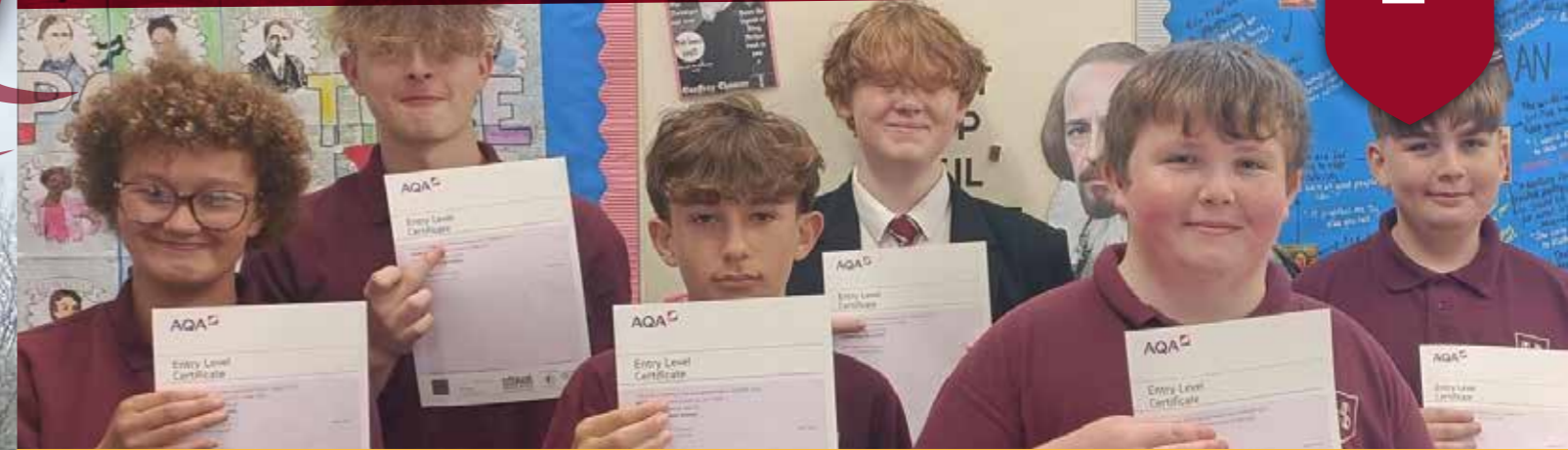

Duke of Edinburgh Award

Practice expedition in May

One Saturday morning, 28 Year 9 and 10 students left to start their practice Bronze D of E expedition at not-so-sunny North Walsham. Students arrived on Saturday morning, fully prepped for a weekend of walking. First up were the tents, in record time! Then all were off for a warm-up walk, as while Sheringham was basking in glorious sunshine, we were walking 7km in some misty conditions. All managed to navigate successfully around Route 1, putting their newfound skills to the test. Then it was back to camp for some delectable delights... students were busy prepping meals and having some warming hot chocolate ready for the evening ahead. Mr King arrived in the evening with a football, so the camp took part in a mass game, ensuring

that everyone was completely worn out and ready for a good sleep. The camp was awake by 6.30am the next day, cooking breakfast and making their teas/hot chocolates before they headed out on their own for the day.

Day 2 was a 12-14km walk, depending on how many wrong turns they took! All groups were fantastic and smashed out a huge walk, carrying their own pack and a tent. The weather was much warmer and made conditions a little more challenging but they coped with the demands brilliantly. The qualifier is at the end of June and we all have lots of confidence to take forward. Well done to all who took part so successfully!



D-Day 80 Commemoration 6 June 2024

Mrs Tosney, Head of History, liaised with Councillor Madeleine Ashcroft and the Mayor, Peter Ratcliffe to commemorate the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day landings in Normandy at Sheringham High School's Library. This highly significant event represented a turning point in the Second World War, heralding the Allied invasion of German-occupied Europe and the start of the long road to Allied victory. It was, however, achieved at the cost of thousands of lives and, 80 years on, very few soldiers who survived the D-Day landings are still alive.

Our school was delighted to be part of the town's commemorative events. Mrs Kate Davis (Governor), the Mayor and Councillor Ashcroft were welcomed by Mrs Hollidge, and were pleased to admire work relating to D-Day written by History students and a display of 'blackout' poetry, written by Year 8 students, using Tom Palmer's brilliant novel 'D-Day Dog'. Two Year 10 students, Eliza and Evie, recited 'D-Day Heroes', a poem written by Chelsea Pensioner Roy Palmer, to an audience of Year 8 students.

The Mayor and Councillor Ashcroft both spoke at the end about the importance of remembering the sacrifices made by the armed forces on 6 June 1944 in the hope that such conflicts would never happen again. Mrs Davis thanked Mrs Tosney and Alex Steward for organising the event.



Year 9 geography fieldwork trip

Year 9 geographers partook in fieldwork enquiries in Hunstanton as part of PD day 2. In somewhat testing conditions, students completed primary fieldwork techniques in exploring the correlation between sediment size and beach shape in and around the fascinating cliffs, and wave cut platforms of Old Hunstanton beach. They completed beach profiles, sediment analysis, wave counts and field sketches before a well-earned lunch break, when the weather improved considerably. In the afternoon, they collected human geography data in relation to the impact of tourism on Hunstanton which they analysed upon their return to school as part of their unit of work surrounding fieldwork in a coastal environment.

This can be so much more than developing a sense of adventure (although that is important!). It is also about building confidence, providing opportunities for volunteering, contributing to conservation programmes or learning a new skill or language. 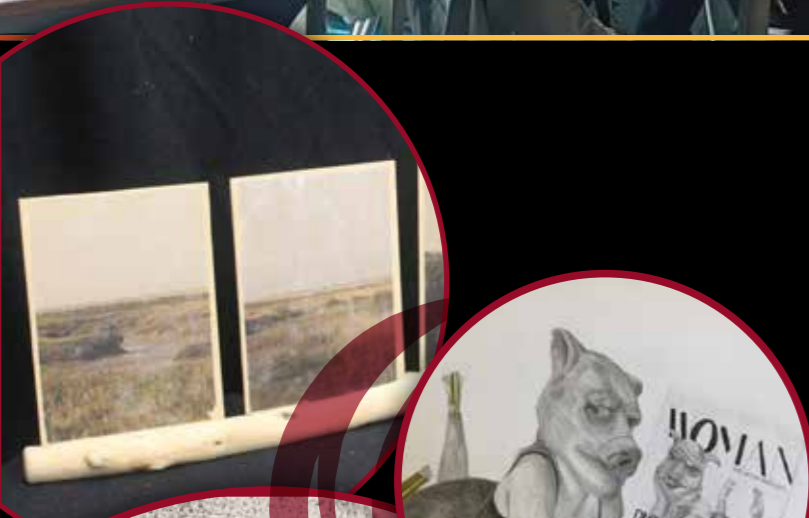
Visit to UCAS HE Discovery Exhibition with year 12
