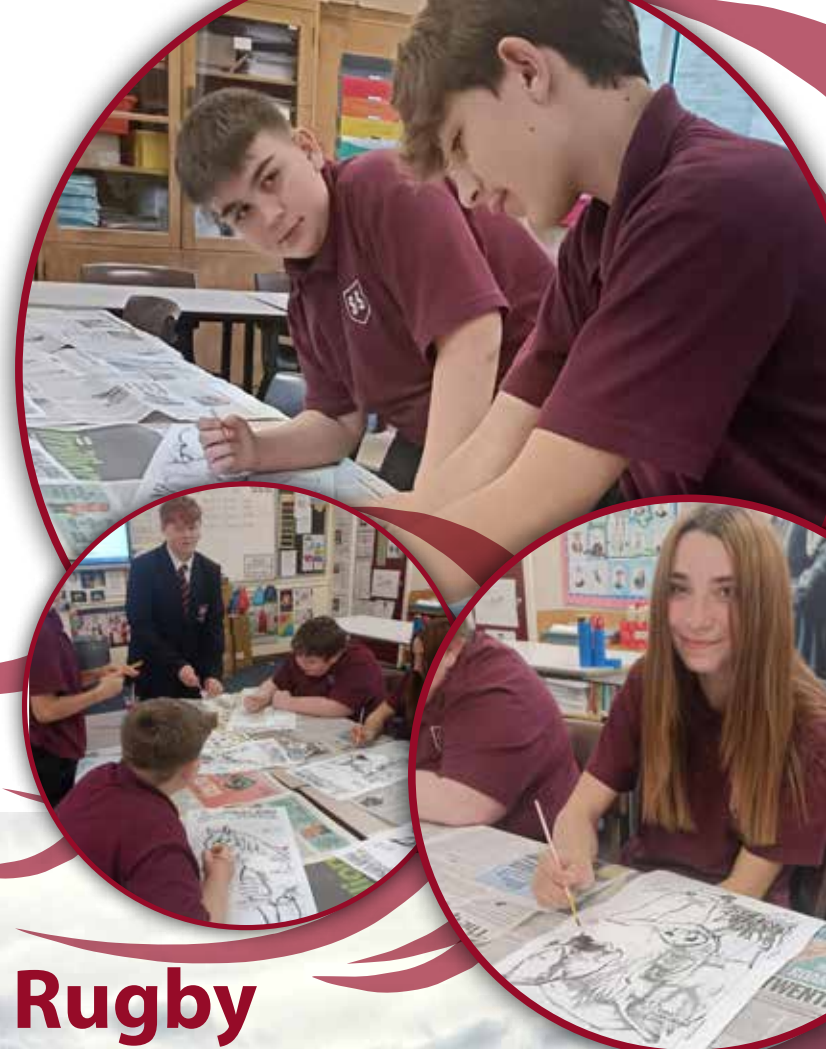
We are currently looking for people to join as community governors. It is a rewarding role.

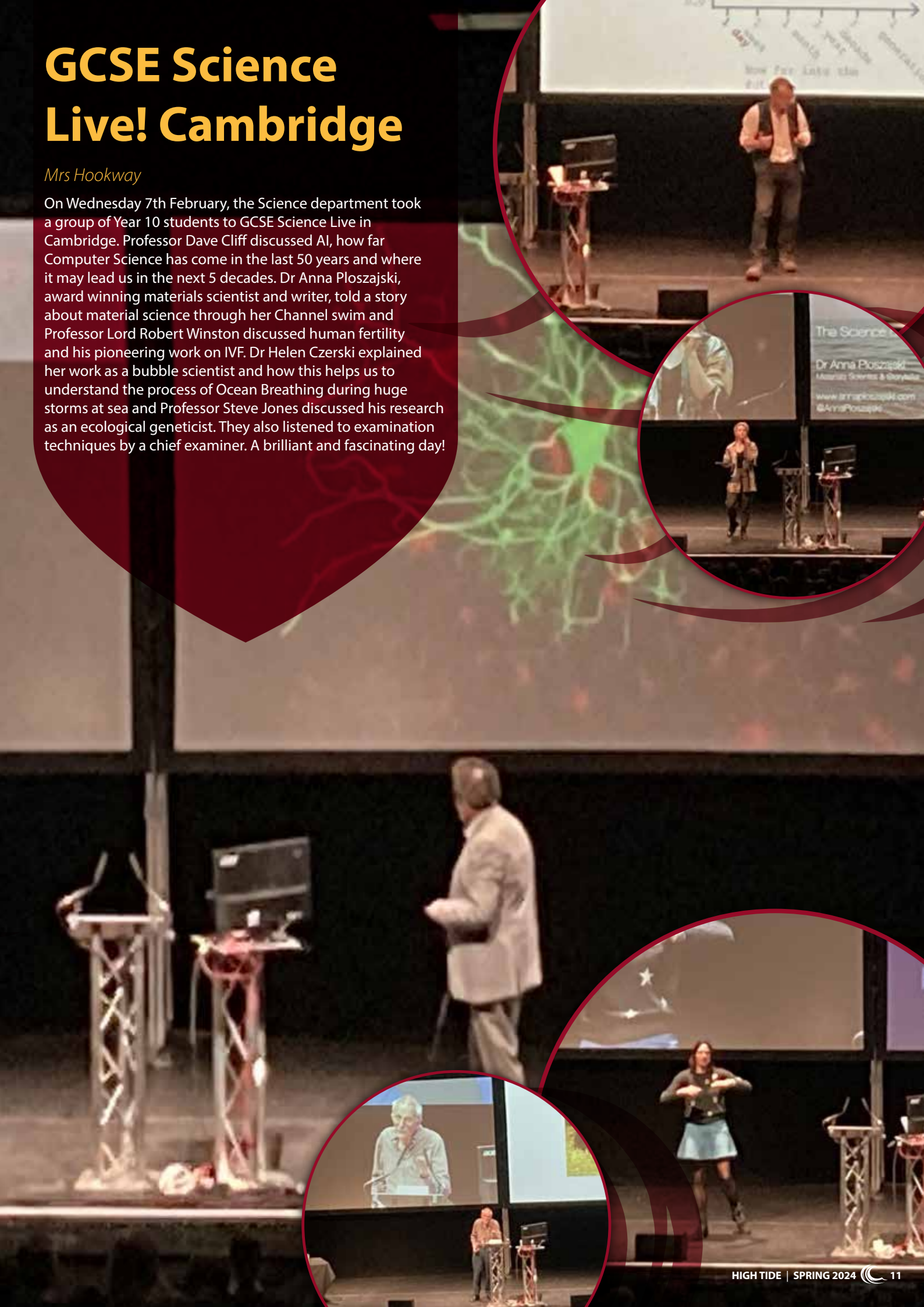

GCSE Science Live! Cambridge

On Wednesday 7th February, the Science department took a group of Year 10 students to GCSE Science Live in Cambridge. Professor Dave Cliff discussed AI, how far Computer Science has come in the last 50 years and where it may lead us in the next 5 decades. Dr Anna Ploszajski, award winning materials scientist and writer, told a story about material science through her Channel swim and Professor Lord Robert Winston discussed human fertility and his pioneering work on IVF. Dr Helen Czerski explained her work as a bubble scientist and how this helps us to understand the process of Ocean Breathing during huge storms at sea and Professor Steve Jones discussed his research as an ecological geneticist. They also listened to examination techniques by a chief examiner. A brilliant and fascinating day!

Youth STEMM Award

The Youth STEMM Award (YSA) is currently open to students in Years 9 and 12. STEMM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths and Medicine. The students whom I have run the Award with previously have enjoyed it immensely. Following a conference, a parent told us:

"She came home so excited and full of the things she had learnt there. Her enthusiasm for science and all things connected has been heightened..."

There are three levels at which the Award is taken, with increasing levels of challenge: Bronze, Silver and Gold. This year, we are offering Bronze to Year 9 and Bronze or Silver to Year 12. The Award has four areas in which pupils are required to gain experience:

- *Inspiring the next generation –*
This could involve helping with clubs, delivering sessions in primary schools, or even helping younger siblings with their Science and Maths homework.
- *Engaging the public –*
This could involve helping at open evenings, speaking in front of groups of people, writing a blog, or writing for the High Tide magazine.
- *Developing your skills and knowledge –*
Evidence of this could involve attending conferences (such as GCSE Science Live!), completing your own project or evidence of research into an area that is of interest.
- *Shaping your future –*
This involves looking at careers in the STEMM areas and could involve careers days and conferences.

Students who complete the Award will receive a certificate and a medal and it is highly regarded by both colleges and universities.

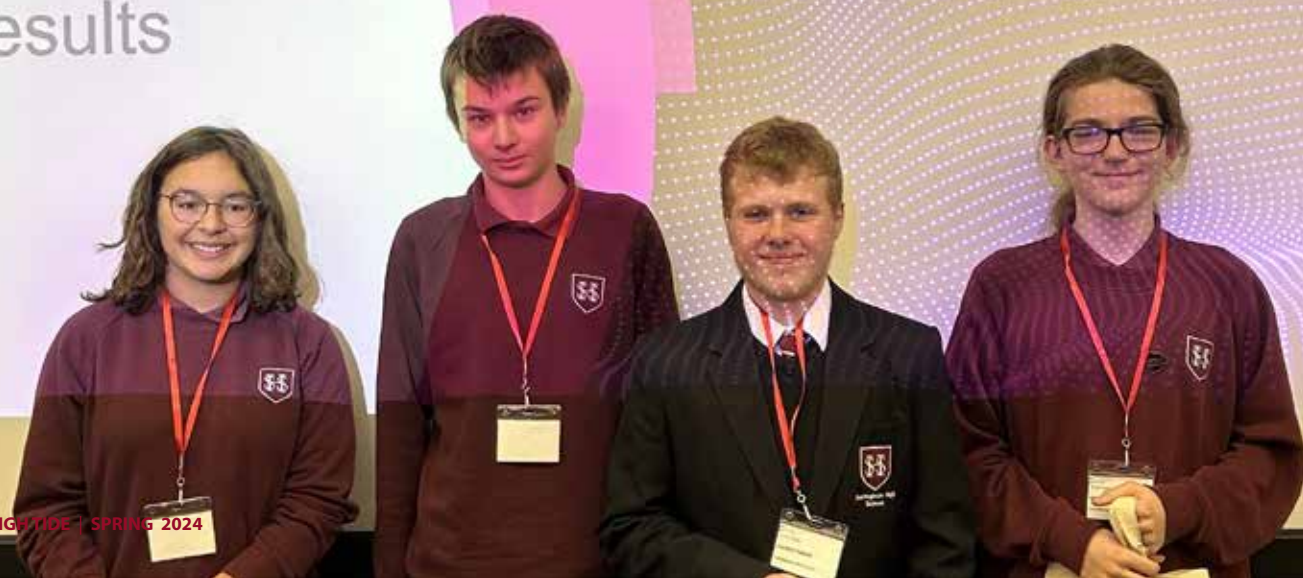


Royal Society of Chemistry 'Top of the bench' chemistry competition

Art Club!

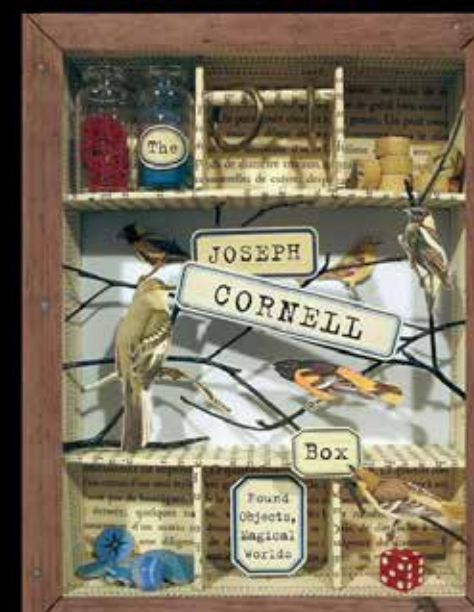
Taking place every Tuesday lunchtime in Room 9 and with a different theme every term, Art Club gives students

the wonderful opportunity to develop and use their creativity on exciting new projects. This term's theme is 'Worlds in a Box'!

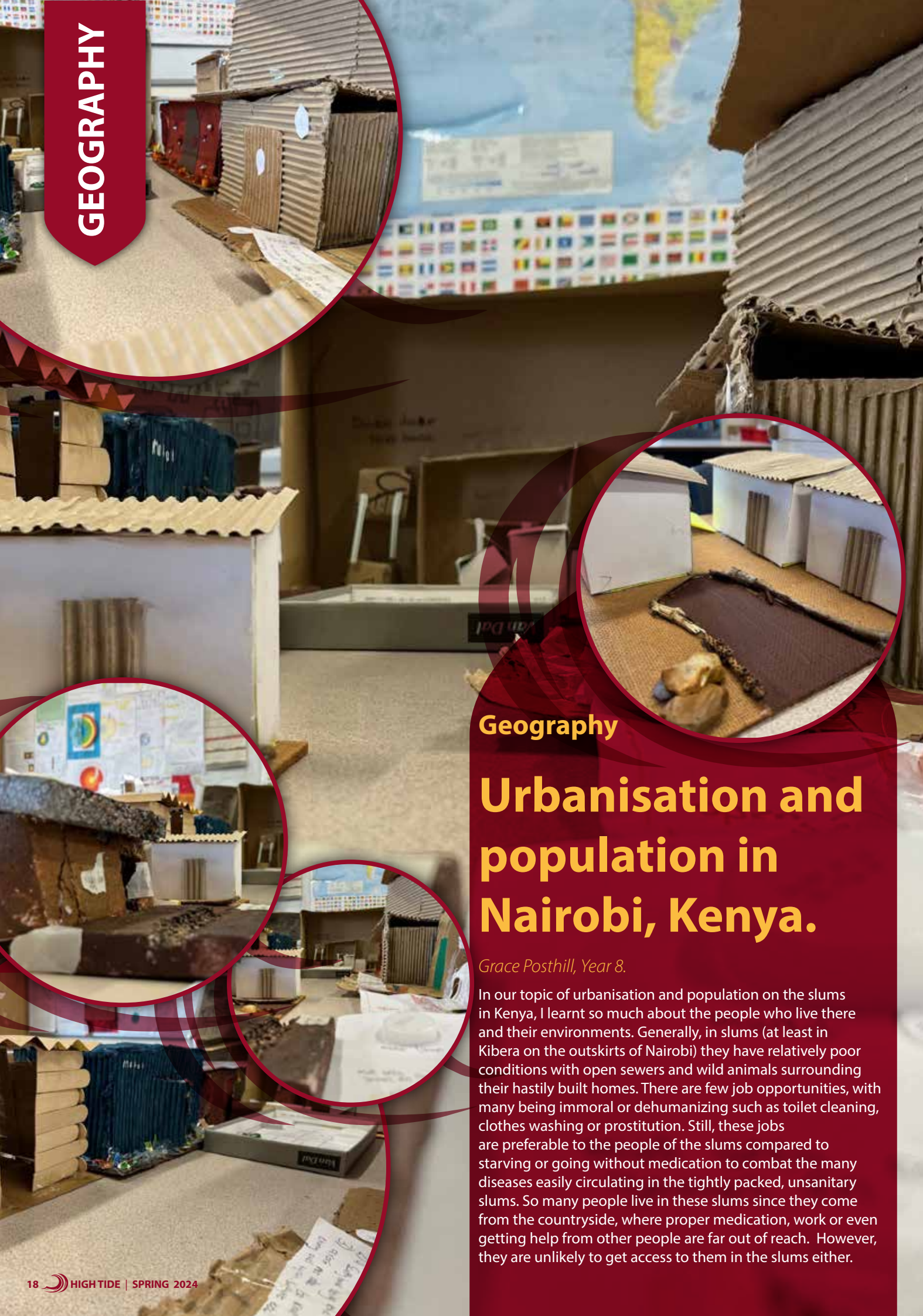

Urbanisation and population in Nairobi, Kenya.

In our topic of urbanisation and population on the slums in Kenya, I learnt so much about the people who live there and their environments. Generally, in slums (at least in Kibera on the outskirts of Nairobi) they have relatively poor conditions with open sewers and wild animals surrounding their hastily built homes. There are few job opportunities, with many being immoral or dehumanizing such as toilet cleaning, clothes washing or prostitution. Still, these jobs are preferable to the people of the slums compared to starving or going without medication to combat the many diseases easily circulating in the tightly packed, unsanitary slums. So many people live in these slums since they come from the countryside, where proper medication, work or even getting help from other people are far out of reach. However, they are unlikely to get access to them in the slums either.

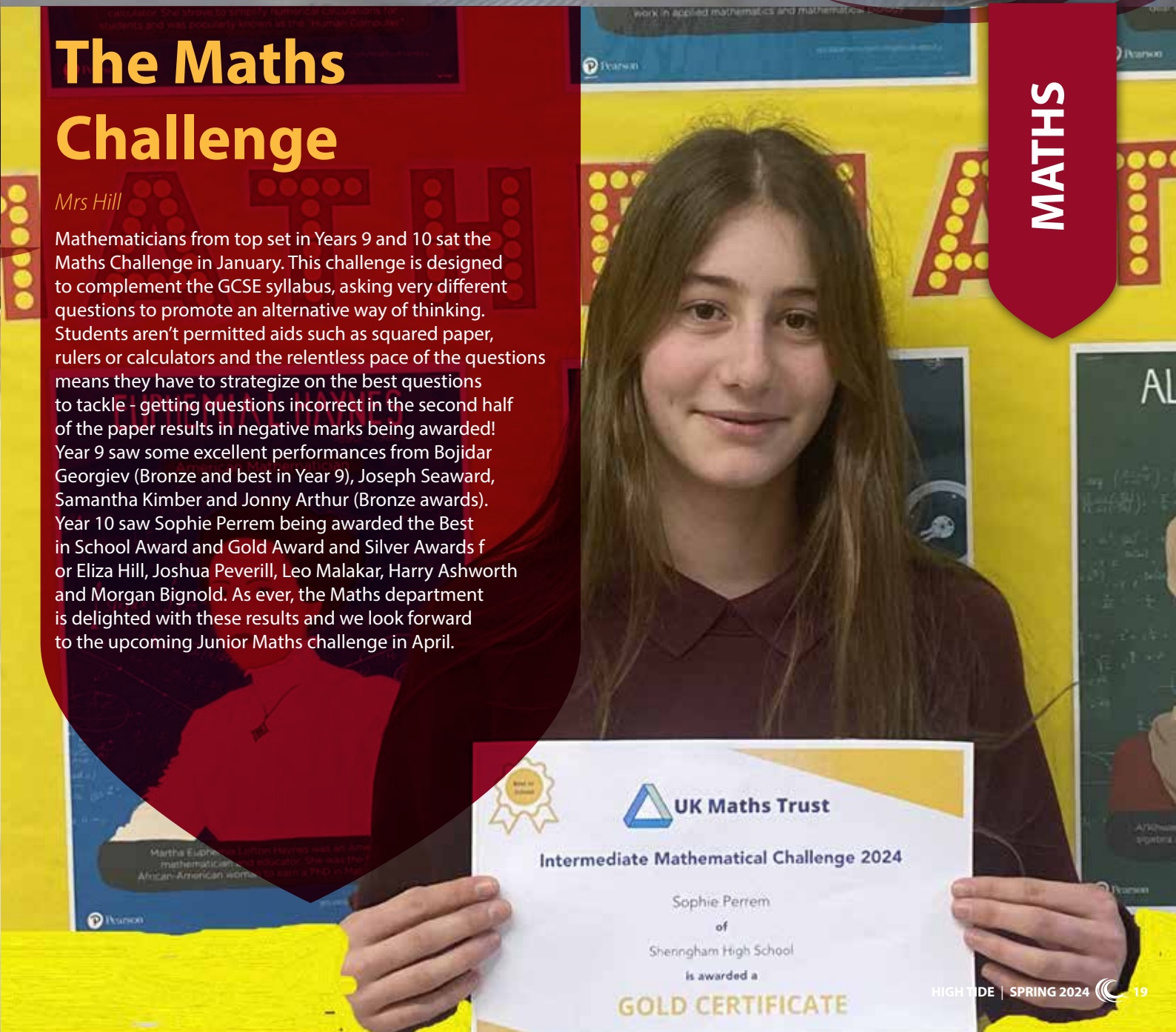

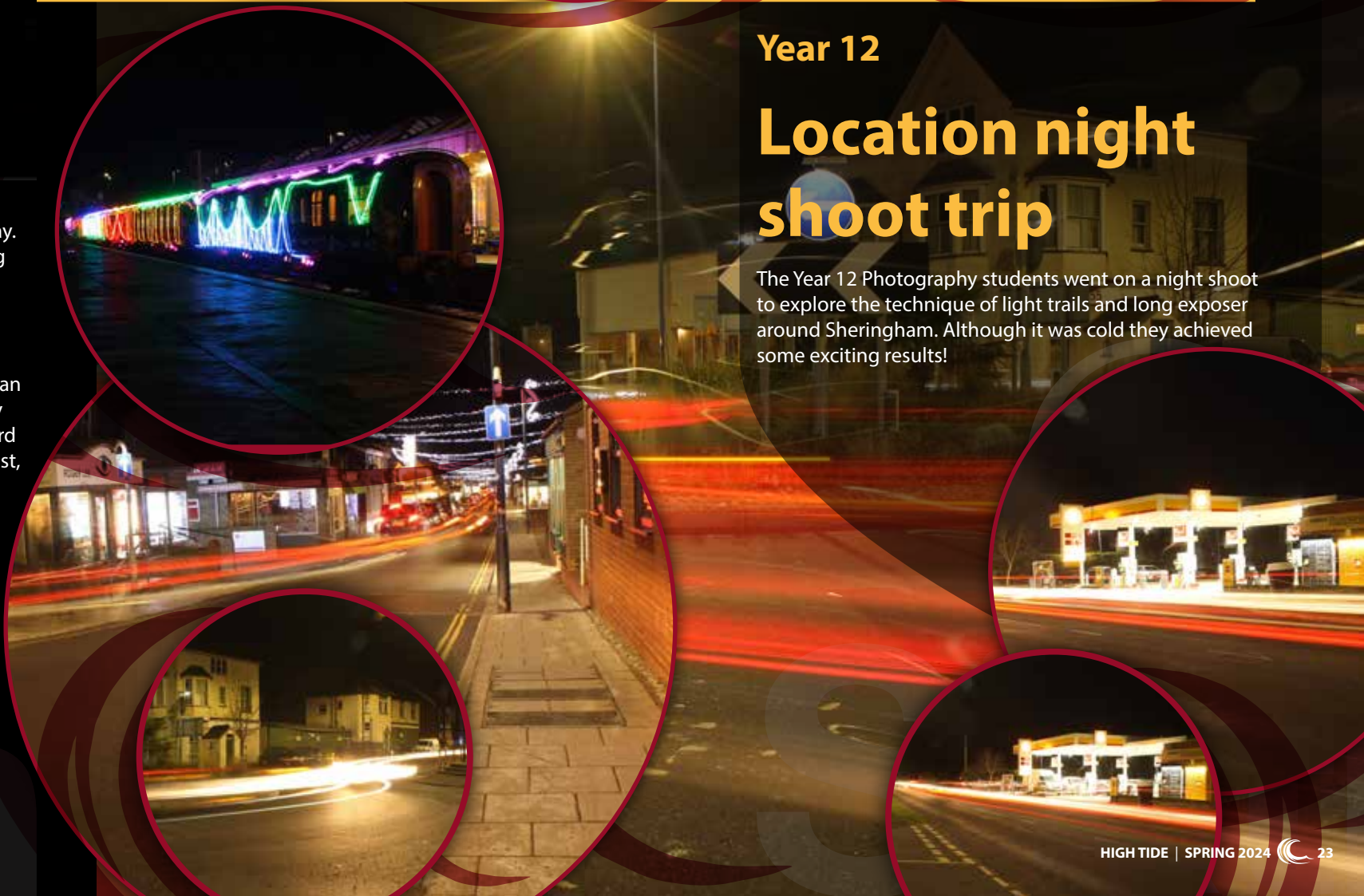

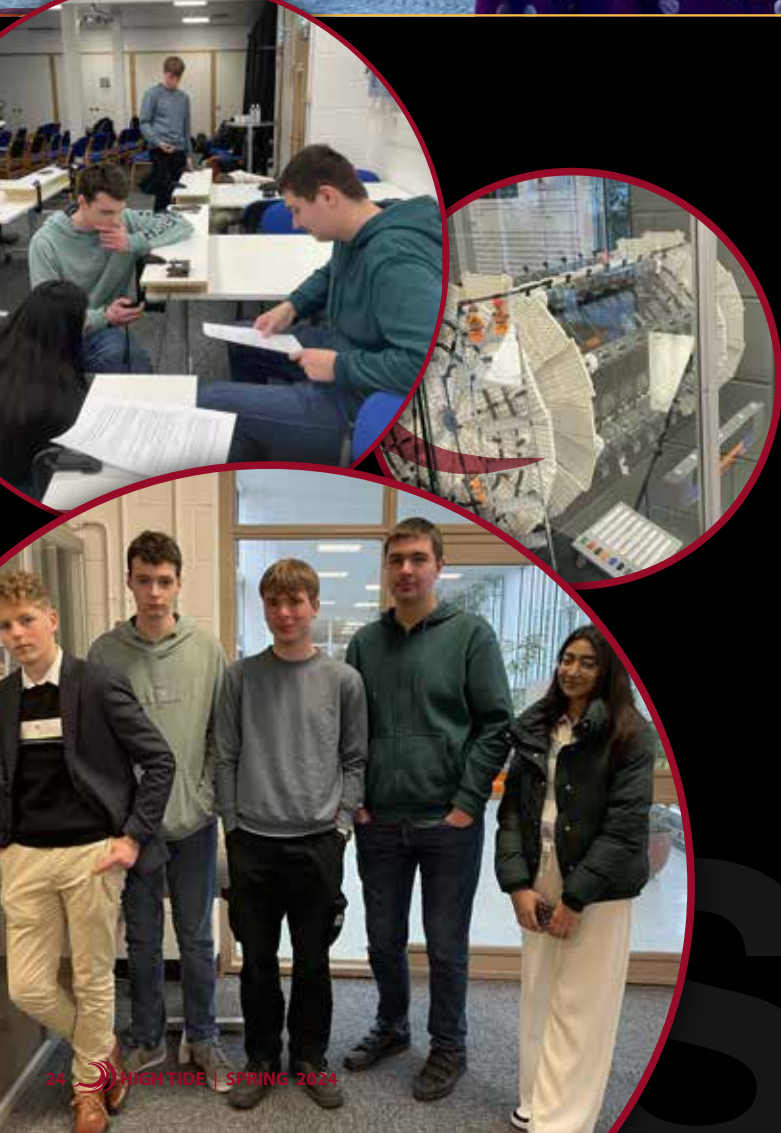

Year 12 trip: The Cambridge Physics Experience

A wet and windy day at the start of February saw our Year 12 Physics students head off to Cambridge for the day. We were given a tour of Churchill College, a sprawling modern college to the West of the city, then a short bus ride to the Cavendish Laboratories, home of many seminal pieces of Physics equipment. Highlights included finding a photo of Oppenheimer in the gallery of past professors and researchers, and the scale model of the Large Hadron Collider made of lego in the Cavendish Museum. The day was not all just looking at things; the students engaged with an Isaac Physics set of problems, a practical investigation to work out the magnitude of gravitational field strength in Cambridge, and heard about the benefits of further education and the Cambridge College system.



The Holocaust - Auschwitz

Four Yr12 students have been working with the Holocaust Education Trust on their Lessons from Auschwitz programme. This important programme involves two online seminars, where students hear from Holocaust survivors, who will share their personal experiences. The programme also included a visit to the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial and Museum on 6 February. We look forward to finding out how our quartet plan to share what they have learnt within the school and wider community. Truly memorable.

Enriching the Sixth Form experience

The Sixth Form have enjoyed a wide range of talks through our link at Gresham's School, on topics including Arts and creative thinking, navigating AI and human futures, and exploring testicular cancer. We remain extremely grateful for these fabulous opportunities.

The Sixth Form has also benefited from fascinating alumni talks about university opportunities at UEA, employment and apprenticeship prospects at Jones Lang LaSalle (JLL), one of our biggest local employers, and the important work of the Terrence Higgins Trust.

Planning for life beyond the Sixth Form

A record number of Yr13 students have applied for university degree courses this year.
